SPORTING SUCCESS AT TE IPUKAREA 2025

Rangitāne whānau showed strength and determination throughout Te Ipukarea 2025 in Whakatū Nelson. Despite challenging weather conditions, our iwi stood proud, competing with skill and commitment across all events.

Rangitāne made a strong start on Friday, securing victories in both Euchre and Tamariki Basketball. Our Euchre players demonstrated sharp decision-making and tactical skill, while our basketball teams displayed impressive coordination and determination on the court. These early wins set the tone for the competition, highlighting the sporting talent within our iwi. On Saturday at Saxton Fields, our tamariki teams continued to impress, securing first place in Netball and Touch Rugby. Their efforts in Tug-o-War earned them a hardfought third-place finish. Our mixed pakeke netball

team delivered a standout performance, claiming first place in their grade. Combined with our tamariki netball teams' first place, Rangitāne secured the overall Netball winners title.

Beyond the competition, the weekend was an opportunity to strengthen relationships within Te Tauihu. The event highlighted the value of collective participation, showing that these moments of coming together are just as important as the competition itself.

A huge mihi to our pakeke and rangatahi who were there to coach and support our tamariki sports, and to our kaimahi and kaikōkiri who came to manaaki.

A special acknowledgment to Will Macdonald for receiving the mauri on behalf of Rangitāne. While preparations have yet to begin, the anticipation within our whānau is growing as we look ahead to hosting Te lpukarea in Wairau in 2026.

A beautiful day spent reconnecting with our whenua, our korero, and each other as we travelled down the East Coast to our southernmost boundary at Waiau Toa.

Each stop was rich with körero and mätauranga generously shared by our whänau.



WEAVING, WHAKAPAPA AND WHENUA



A group of our local wāhine participating in the Rangitāne o Wairau Toi Māori cloak weaving wānanga travelled to Meretoto/Ship Cove to harvest kiekie for the kaupapa. This is an ongoing project that began last year, and it not only teaches participants how to weave kākahu, but also takes them across our rohe to learn about and gather various natural materials and fibres, such as kiekie, tikumu, nānēa, and harakeke.

Rangitāne has a rich history connected to Meretoto and the surrounding area, and we often visit to share and retell our pūrākau. Two pouwhenua, Kupe and Tāne-nui-a-Rangi stand there offering opportunities for visitors to reconnect with these stories.

This trip was led by Aunty Marg Bond, who is overseeing the kākahu weaving project. She was supported by trustee Judith MacDonald, who shared pūrakau about the area with our weavers, and Kaitohu Taiao Robbie McKinney. The wānanga concluded at Tuamātene Marae where the kiekie was sorted and processed for the next stage.

Rangitāne o Wairau trustee and Toi Māori kaikōkiri, Keelan Walker, shared that the kaupapa has been incredibly popular so far. "We have a really good group of weavers who are genuinely passionate about the kaupapa and motivated to learn as much as they can," he said. "The goal is to have our first cloak ready for whānau to use early next year."

TE TAPUWAETAHI O RANGITĀNE

Established in 2009, Te Tapuwaetahi o Rangitāne is a three-day festival celebrating all things Rangitāne.

Previously known as the Rangitāne Ahurei, the name was changed to Te Tapuwaetahi o Rangitāne in recognition of the whakatauki "Tapuwae tahi o Rangitāne-nui-a-rangi," which speaks of the single footprint of great Rangitāne of the heavens.

After thirteen years, Rangitāne o Wairau is proud to once again host the festival over Labour Weekend 2025, bringing together whānau from the three North Island Rangitāne iwi — Tāmaki-nui-a-Rua, Wairarapa, and Manawatū — to celebrate, share our rich history, and showcase our region.

Throughout the weekend, there will be a range of sports and activities to participate in, including the prestigious Rangitāne Tū Mai Rā Awards dinner.

In preparation for this special gathering, we will be holding a Whānau Wānanga at Tuamātene Marae on Saturday, 24 May 2025. Join us to find out how you can support the event and help manaaki our manuhiri. We'll also be learning Rangitāne waiata and haka.

TAONGA FOR GENERATIONS: FLAXBOURNE HERITAGE CENTRE OPENS

This Centre is so much more than just a building — it's a taonga. A place for the community, for visitors, and for learning. It holds the stories of the past and speaks

to the resilience and determination of this incredible community, particularly in the wake of the 2016 Kaikōura earthquake.

Rangitāne o Wairau have been proud to support this kaupapa since 2020. Our connection to this whenua runs deep — our tūpuna lived and fished along this coast, harvested harakeke from these lands, and raised generations of whānau here. These

stories, and the whakapapa of this place, are now woven into the heart of the Centre.

The opening was a stunning occasion — a large crowd gathered, the ribbon was cut, and the community turned out in force. Speeches were shared by local community leaders, as well as tamariki including Nina Marfell (sixth generation Awatere), who captured the spirit of the day when she said, "Today is the culmination of the hopes and dreams of a lot of people."

A big mihi to our team for the manaaki and mahi behind the scenes — from the BBQ to the korero, it was a true team effort. A special acknowledgement to Jodie Palatchie for representing Rangitane on the Flaxbourne Heritage Trust over the past five years, ensuring our korero and history was appropriately captured within the Centre.
