

RANGATAHI RISING: EMPOWERING IDENTITY AND CONFIDENCE

Our rangatahi ventured on a Hōtoke Wānanga that wove together adventure, cultural learning, and connection through whakapapa.

Over three days, they travelled across Kaikōura and Hanmer Springs, embracing opportunities that strengthened their physical confidence and deepened their cultural connection.

The wānanga began with an overnight stay in Kaikōura, where the group took part in ziplining through native bush. For many, it was a first-time experience. It was an opportunity to challenge themselves, support one another, and build confidence in a setting that celebrated te taiao.

From there, the rōpū travelled to Hanmer Springs for two nights of whakawhanaungatanga and mātauranga. Between relaxing in the hot pools and sharing kai, our rangatahi immersed themselves in learning waiata, haka, whakapapa, and pūrākau. These sessions created space for our rangatahi to explore their identity, connect with their cousins, and strengthen their role within our iwi.

Our rangatahi returned home with new skills, stronger connections, and a deeper sense of who they are and where they come from.

This wānanga reaffirmed the importance of creating spaces where rangatahi feel seen, heard, and valued. By stepping outside their comfort zones and engaging deeply with their culture, they not only strengthened their own sense of identity but also contributed to the collective wellbeing of our iwi. The memories made and lessons learned will continue to ripple outward, into their homes, their kura, and the generations to come.

Ngā mihi nui to our Kaikōkiri and pakeke who guided and supported the kaupapa. Your dedication ensures our rangatahi are inspired and empowered to carry our mātauranga forward.

TE TAPUWAETAHI O RANGITĀNE PREPARATIONS CONTINUE FOR AHUREI

As Labour Weekend draws near, preparations for Te Tapuwaetahi o Rangitāne are well underway. The excitement is building as we get ready to welcome our whanaunga from Tāmaki-nui-a-Rua, Wairarapa, and Manawatū. This festival is more than an event. It is a celebration of whakapapa, identity, and unity.

To ensure we stand strong in our pōwhiri, we will be holding a series of Haka Pōwhiri practices in the lead-up to the festival. These wānanga will be led by Wirihana de Thierry and are open to all who want to be part of this awesome kaupapa. Kai and refreshments will be provided.

These sessions are a chance to learn, connect, and prepare together. Whether you are new to haka or have stood in the front line before, your presence will strengthen our collective voice.

Waiata practices are also happening every Thursday at 5.30pm at Tuamātene Marae. These run for one hour and are open to everyone. Come along, bring your whānau, and learn Rangitāne waiata and mōteatea.

bν registrations merchandise collection at Ūkaipō. Kai mō te pō and whakawhanaungatanga will take place later that day. Hākinakina will be held at Marlborough Boys' College and St Mary's School, with categories and grades to be confirmed. That evening, the Rangitane Tū Mai Rā Awards Dinner will be held at the Marlborough Events Centre. The following day includes Te Hītori o Rangitāne o Wairau Hīkoi, wānanga, whakapapa sessions, and evaluations at Ūkaipō. The poroporoaki will take place in the evening, followed by housie and quiz night at Ūkaipō, and a tamariki and rangatahi movie night at Event Cinemas Blenheim.

Registrations for the festival close on 20 September. If you have not yet registered, now is the time. Official merchandise orders have closed, but there will be plenty of ways to show your support at the ahurei.

LOCAL BODY ELECTIONS 2025

This year's local body elections are about more than just choosing councillors. They're about protecting representation that honours Te Tiriti o Waitangi and ensures Māori have a seat at the decision-making table. Across Aotearoa, binding polls will ask voters whether to keep or remove Māori Wards for future elections.

Māori Wards provide a direct pathway for tangata whenua to influence council decisions that affect our whenua, our wai, and our communities. They promote inclusion, equity, and recognition of the unique place of Māori in this country's governance.

Voting to keep Māori Wards is a vote for representation, for rangatiratanga, and for a future where Māori voices are heard and respected.

Voting runs from 9 September to 11 October 2025. Make sure you're enrolled, encourage your whānau to do the same, and cast your vote to keep Māori Wards.

DIALYSIS UNIT TO OPEN IN WAIRAU

We're pleased to share that a new four-chair dialysis unit will open in Wairau this October.

For those living with kidney disease, dialysis can be a long and difficult journey, often requiring hours of travel each week to access treatment in Whakatū Nelson. This new unit will ease some of that burden, allowing whānau to receive care closer to home.

It will also support those managing dialysis at home, with access to local clinical support and facilities when needed.

This development is the result of strong community partnership - Health NZ, Marlborough Primary Health, Te Piki Oranga, iwi and others coming together with a shared commitment to pae ora: healthy futures for our people. We mihi to everyone who's helped bring this service to our rohe. It will make a meaningful difference in the lives of many.

MANA TAIAO | OUR ENVIRONMENT

UPDATE ON BSTP DISCHARGE CONSENT AND PROJECT PROGRESS



The Blenheim Sewage Treatment Plant (BSTP) discharge consent has been formally lodged with Marlborough District Council. It is currently on hold while national wastewater standards are being finalised. These standards will determine how the consent is processed and what discharge limits will apply.

In the meantime, the Project Working Group (PWG) includes representatives from Rangitāne o Wairau, Ngāti Rārua, and Ngāti Toa Rangatira, supported by Troy Brockbank, MDC staff, and Beca as lead consultants. Together, they continue to advance key workstreams.

One of the most significant initiatives is the establishment of a Kaitiaki Forum. This forum, led by iwi representatives, will develop a monitoring programme to assess the cultural health of Waikārapi (Wairau Lagoons) and evaluate the impact of the BSTP on the awa.

Other ongoing work includes the creation of an Environmental Enhancement Fund (EEF), installation of signage at the Wairau Bar, and planning for future upgrades to the treatment plant. There have been recent personnel changes, with MDC Engineer Stuart Donaldson retiring and Beca Project Manager Mark Crooke returning to the UK.

The next PWG hui will provide updates on proposed plant upgrades, outline future workstreams, and include a briefing on the implications of the Water Services Bill.

Looking ahead, new legislation may result in the consent process being automatically paused for up to two years. This will depend on confirmation once the final provisions are enacted. If the consent is publicly notified, processing could take an additional 12 to 18 months.

Draft consent conditions have been agreed upon, outlining a staged approach over the next 15 years. Rangitāne continues to advocate for a 10-year term. The plan includes feasibility studies for upgrades, exploration of alternative discharge options such as vineyard irrigation, and a long-term strategy for relocating the plant. Regular monitoring, annual reporting, and five-yearly environmental reviews are built into the framework.

Rangitāne remain central to this kaupapa, ensuring that the mauri of Te Pokohiwio-Kupe and the Wairau Estuary is upheld. Updates will continue to be shared as the mahi progresses.

TE AROPIPI - OUR COMMITMENT AS KAITIAKI

We are set to unveil our Taiao Strategy and Iwi Environmental Management Plan, Te Aropipi, a landmark strategy that reaffirms our enduring connection to te taiao and our role as kaitiaki across Te Tauihu.

Described by Kaiwhakahaere Matua Corey Hebberd as "an assertion of our mana," Te Aropipi is more than a technical document. It is a living expression of whakapapa, mātauranga Māori, and ahi kā.

Developed with the insights and aspirations of our whānau, the plan outlines a comprehensive framework for environmental protection, cultural restoration, and climate resilience, grounded in ancestral obligations and contemporary leadership.

Key objectives include:

- Restoring the mauri of Te Pokohiwi-o-Kupe, Waikārapi (Wairau Lagoons), and Wairau River
- Advocating for sustainable practices in the Marlborough Sounds
- Preparing for climate change through intergenerational knowledge and modern tools
- Upholding customary rights in fisheries and planning processes
- Empowering whānau, hapū, and uri as active environmental leaders

The strategy also gives practical effect to commitments made in our Treaty Settlement and the Crown Apology, reinforcing mutual obligations between the iwi and the Crown.

"Te Aropipi is a blueprint for how we engage with the whenua, moana and wai of our rohe," Hebberd said. "It centres people, place, and whakapapa, and invites all those working in our rohe to walk alongside us with integrity, respect, and openness."
