Matariki is the period to mark the changing of the year. It is a time of remembrance and paying respect to those who have passed on and a time for new beginnings.

It is with sadness that we recently farewelled our eldest kuia, Aunty Isobel Smith (nee MacDonald), daughter of James Nicholas "Manny" MacDonald and Helena (Horina) Isabel Phillips. Moe mai ra e kuia. Our thoughts are with all those who have lost loved ones this past year.

To celebrate Matariki we will be gathering at the Wairau Bar on Sunday 19 July at 5.30am. Nau mai haere mai, we welcome all who wish to come along to acknowledge this significant time.

When Matariki re-appeared in June/July our ancestors would read the stars to predict the success of the season ahead; clear bright stars are a good sign while hazy stars are a sign of a cold, harsh winter. If one star shines brighter, there will be lots of kai from the source the star represents.

Te Iwa o Matariki - the nine stars of Matariki:

Matariki signafies reflection, hope, our connection to the environment and the gathering of people.

Pōhutukawa is the star associated with those that have passed on.

Waitī ties to the bodies of fresh water and the food sources within it.

Waitā ties to the ocean and the food sources within it.

Waipuna-ā-rangi is associated with the rain.

Tupuānuku is the star associated with everything that grows within the soil to be harvested for food.

Tupuārangi is connected to everything that grows up in the trees; fruits, berries, and birds.

Ururangi is associated with the winds.

Hiwa-i-te-rangi is the wishing star associated with granting our wishes and realising our aspirations for the coming year.

Matariki period for this year is 13-20 July.

On 17 June 1840 Ihaia Kaikōura of Rangitāne signed Te Tiriti o Waitangi at Kākāpō Bay in Te Whanganui (Port Underwood). He was one of nine chiefs to sign on the day. Kaikōura had assumed the mantle of leadership following the death of his uncle, Te Ruaoneone. He was one of a number of Rangitāne who joined Ngāti Toa in resisting settler encroachment of the Wairau in 1843. In the two decades after 1840 Kāikōura was a staunch advocate of Rangitāne treaty rights.

Dr. Melanie Riwai-Couch | *PhD, MA, B.Ed.*

Dr Melanie Riwai-Couch is the Kaihautū Māori and an education consultant for Evaluation Associates. She is an experienced researcher, evaluator and change manager for kāhui ako. Prior to joining Evaluation Associates Melanie was the Tumuaki (principal) of Te Kura Kaupapa Māori o Te Whānau Tahi, a year 1-13 Māori immersion school located in Christchurch.

Melanie has a PhD in Education awarded by the University of Canterbury in 2015. Her doctoral research investigated iwi-school communities of practice and their contribution to Māori student achievement.

Prior to her doctorate Melanie completed two Ed.D. papers in Education Leadership and Change through Griffith University, has a Master of Education with Distinction (University of Canterbury), a Bachelor of Education specialising in Physical Education and a Secondary Diploma of Teaching.

Melanie is also a former Trustee of Te Rūnanga a Rangitāne o Wairau. **Āwhina Twomey** | Dip. of Design & Art, B.Ed., Te Panekiretanga o Te Reo

Āwhina began as a full-time Kaiwhakaako Māori or Māori Educator, under a Ministry of Education contract promoting 'Learning Experiences Outside of The Classroom'. The following year she was also offered the job of Kaitiaki Taonga Māori, looking after tangible and intangible taonga Māori within the workplace and ensuring that iwi/hapū/whānau have a kanohi Māori that they can liaise and relate to or with, promote or organise Māori driven kaupapa, assist and/or educate Museum staff and the wider community on Māori related issues. Āwhina has been a staunch supporter of cultural aspirations for Rangitane, dating back to the painting of the mural at Tuamātene Marae. She was heavily involved in the repatriation in 2009, also the Deed of Settlement signing in 2010.

Dr. Peter Meihana | PhD, MA

Peter Meihana was born in the Wairau (Blenheim) and is of Rangitāne, Ngāti Kuia, Ngāti Apa, and Ngāi Tahu descent. He is a former trustee of Te Rūnanga o Ngāti Kuia and current trustee of Te Rūnanga

a Rangitāne o Wairau. Peter teaches history in the School of Humanities, Massey University. Peter's doctoral research examined the 'idea' of Maori privilege and its role in the colonisation of Aotearoa-New Zealand. His research interests include Māori history, tribal history and colonisation.

Jeremy MacLeod | BA (Hons), MA, BMPA, Tohu Whakapakari a Te Kōhanga Reo, Te Panekiretanga o Te Reo, Licensed Translator, Māori Language Commissioner.

Jeremy is heavily involved in the revitalisation of te reo Māori plight.

He has served on the maiden Te Mātāwai board and is currently serving on the Māori Language Commission. He was instrumental in the development of the Tangata Rau, Reo Kotahi Language & Cultural Revitalisation Strategy for Rangitāne. He has served on the Te Rūnanga a Rangitāne o Wairau Trust Board.

Jeremy and his wife Te Rina manage two kōhanga reo in Hastings. He is currently completing the finishing touches on his PhD thesis, his research topic being dialectal variations of te reo Māori.

RANGITĀNE HOUSE AT FULL CAPACITY

Since our last update on the commercial operation, things have continued to move at pace. The ongoing impact of COVID-19 remains with us as we continue to navigate the waters ahead.

We have been pleased to see that the quick action we took to engage with our tenants early on has seen both us and our tenants weather the storm, and with Aotearoa now out of lockdown, a sense of cautious optimism is apparent.

Compared to many iwi and private businesses around Aotearoa our current liquidity means that we are strongly positioned to take advantage of investment opportunities as they arise as a result of this disruption.

Despite challenging economic times, we are pleased to report that the performance of our commercial operation remains robust. As at 1 July, we are thrilled to report that Rangitane House is 100% occupied. This is a new record under Rangitane ownership. Not only does the record tenancy of Rangitane House improve its underlying

value, it also generates improved cash flow and return for the Group.

Our managed fund portfolio has continued to perform respectably, and the fund has recovered from the losses that occurred amidst the peak of the COVID-19 pandemic. Active management by Milford continues to protect the value of the fund in response to recent turbulence in global markets.

With volatility in the fisheries sector, we opted to delay our April ACE Tender Round. Management have now issued the tender documents, with key stocks for lease being rock lobster/crayfish and southern blue whiting. We anticipate that, due to uncertainties around global demand for seafood, a reduction in revenue over last year is likely from these quota stocks.

Notwithstanding this, we are continuing to seek out good investment opportunities that meet our investment criteria and add value to Rangitāne. With our balance sheet in a strong and robust position, carrying in excess of \$4m in cash on deposit, we are in a good position to take up investment opportunities that arise as the economy recovers.
